We expect to do some minor remodeling of the old facility while we are shut down and at a minimum we plan to repaint the walls and maybe the ceiling, take up the old carpet and maybe just stain the concrete underneath. And we will be reorganizing our collection, some might stay in the old building and some be moved to the new facility. We have to box it up anyway in order to paint and take up the carpet. Many thanks to Mary Jo Cox for keeping the new building on track, to Cindy Bowden and Lou Brackett for cataloging and organizing our collection. And of course, Malinda Brooks keeps us on track with the history of the area.

Have you walked on the new walking path in downtown Pine Mountain? It's the one created from the old railroad bed rails to trails and it's called Man O' War Trail. Harris County was the first required by the State of Georgia to put up historical interpretative panels for this project. The first of several is installed across the street from the Tourism building and tells of the trains that went through Chipley/Pine Mountain. You can't miss it, there is a small roof over it. Some of the information came from the internet but some came from the Chipley Historical Center. I've been working with Susanne Newberry of Southern Research to help locate materials suitable for this panel and some of the others they plan to install.

A Volunteer's First Impressions

The excitement of seeing the new building moving forward inspires me to write about my volunteer experience at the Chipley Historical Center. So many local people have donated meaningful items and records that represents the families here from the 1800's into the 21st Century.

Beginning in February, I unlocked the door and stepped into the unknown of what occupies the building. Big locks on the jail cell doors made of welded iron ribbons incarcerated more than a few folks. Names are scratched on one wall. Perhaps one day a student will research the life of one soul sifting through the records to identify him. Each person had some history with Pine Mountain.

Glass cases full of memorabilia ranging from the Korean War, World Wars I and II, to antique medical equipment of doctors who cared for multiple generations, and to church records representing Pine Mountain's communities are neatly organized into eye catching displays. Old town photos and maps prove the town's growth and tribulations. I discover the old photographs and newspapers.

The recommended Volunteer to-do list by the door is an outline of possibilities, but step one for me is understanding what the Chipley Historical Center is, what it has, and what it offers people. I try to note how it is organized so I may answer questions quickly. Luckily, some good Volunteer souls have systematically catalogued each item noting who made the donation and establishing a numerical reference to it. This level of organization creates immense value to those researching their roots.

My first telephone call was a gentleman from Detroit who had completed a 23&Me DNA analysis and discovered he has third generation relatives in Pine Mountain. He had documented that his great, great, great grandfather had been a slave on a cotton plantation in the Pine Mountain area. Additionally, he had found in the State archives census data showing his father had been incarcerated in a Middle Georgia prison. Vice-Chair Malinda Brooks documented his crime as theft in Harris County. Upon paying his dues to society, he left Georgia for Detroit in the 1870's to improve his fortunes in the industrial North. His family can now continue to write their family history.

If you choose to join the Volunteer Brigade of the Chipley Historical Center, you will be impressed with both their organization, and "how" it is organized. Every Volunteer has a value, find yours.

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A Volunteer's Value"Pandemic 100 Years Earlier"

Those of you who are in the health care industry may recall the name of Rupert Blue. Following a medical degree from University of Maryland, he interned at the Marine Hospital Service which later became known as the Public Health Service (PHS). His career took him to the 1900-1904 San Francisco bubonic plaque epidemic, the 1905 New Orleans yellow fever outbreak where on both, he crystalized the value of good public hygiene. He was appointed Surgeon General of the United States under a Republican in January 1912, and also served under a Democrat President until March 1920. Under his watch at the PHS, bacteriology moved to the forefront as did public health sanitation and education initiatives. But historically, despite his successes and the end of his career at the League of Nations, his legacy will always be overshadowed by the Spanish Flu epidemic that killed 675,000 Americans. Surgeon General Rupert Blue was my great grand uncle.

Ask questions of your loved one's life experiences and document it for your children. In 1918 wearing a mask was not a political statement. It shouldn't be now either. Stay safe.


Buy a Brick Program

Remember Air Mail

How many of you remember Air Mail? With today's electronic, nearly instant communication it's hard to remember that in the mid-twentieth century air mail was the quickest way to get a letter across the nation. Sending a letter by air mail cost more but guaranteed that it would get there as guickly as possible. While air mail in the United States actually began in 1918. President Franklin D. Roosevelt and Postmaster General James A. Farley celebrated its twentieth anniversary with National Air Mail Week May 15-21, 1938. Air mail week included the design of a special 6-cent red eagle stamp. Each city was also encouraged to design and use a special stamp on the air mail letters. called a cachet, that represented something special about their location. Many airline companies, including the now defunct Eastern Air Lines, got their start by flying air mail. Although flying the mail was somewhat dangerous in the early days, the government did pay well for the service, and the contracts often kept small air lines aloft until passenger service finally took hold. The History Center recently received an air mail envelope postmarked Chipley, May 19, 1938, using the 6-cent red eagle stamp. The envelope is also stamped with Chipley's cachet – a rendering of the Tavern at Pine Mountain State Park, now the ranger station at FDR State Park. This envelope represents several historical aspects, including the former name of the town and the state park, along with the special postage stamp and the 1938 postmark, so it is a nice addition to our center's holdings.

Native American and African American History
